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NARRATOR: Thank you for tuning in today to Channel One, the first number in TV entertainment. Although other programs have taken me to the Florida Everglades and rural India... that’s rural India, not rural Indiana... today’s show is a little closer to home. As a matter of fact our show today originates from the bathroom of my home. Why such an exotic setting you ask? Today I’m going to show you how to bathe a cat.

Some time ago I did a practice session for this program and I’m pleased to report that my wounds have healed and I have some real important information for you about watering a cat. During that practice session, my cat was surprised but she is very smart and I can tell today that she is... suspicious.

Now, if the TV cameras will tilt down... (*Points.*) down... down here... notice there is a cat tied to the drain pipe beneath the sink. That is my cat, a female cat named Sheba. Why tied to a drain pipe? That’s so we can find the cat when the water starts running.

I’ll just start the water running in the tub. Not too hot and not too cold. Make the water just the temperature that you like because you’re going to be getting in there and you might as well be comfortable. (*Turns the faucets on and jumps back from the cat.*) Oh! See that? Sheba almost pulled the pipes from the sink. Yes, well, same to you, sweetie.

In the U.S. each year, more money is spent on cat food than baby food. I'm not sure what that means. Cats have five toes on their front feet and four toes on the back. I assume that they can run faster on their front feet than they can on their back feet. They sweat through their paws and I'm sure Sheba is sweating at the moment. (*Turns off water faucets.*) Well, enough of the interesting stuff, let's get back to our task at hand.

Rule One in preparing to bathe a cat is to prepare yourself. Notice, now, that I am getting dressed for the occasion. This is a baseball chest protector. (*As she slips it on, she continues talking.*) You know, I had an idea and if someone out there wants to steal it, I won't mind. It's an automated cat wash. Yes, like a car wash.
